He then worked at IBM and is now an electronics technician at the USDA Southern Regional Research Center near City Park in New Orleans. He has built three homes and a camp, owns two 1954 Fords, belongs to the Horseless Carriage Club, and enjoys genealogy. His wife, Charlene, is from New Orleans; they have three grown children and ten grandchildren.

After reading about LASTA in

the newspaper, Wayne joined in 2003. He has been volunteering his time ever since. He has a life-long interest in railroads and has collected model trains, but has no layout today. "I have a life size model to work on now," he
